



A new school for 500+ pupils in Kenya

An ambitious project to transform a dilapidated and under-funded primary school in rural Kenya into a first-class facility with the capacity to deliver an education worth having, ensuring the long and tiring walk to school for hundreds of disadvantaged children is a worthwhile one.

The need

Primary education has been free in Kenya since 2003. However, the reality of a government-funded education for over 6 million pupils in over 25,000 primary schools is that limited financial resources are spread very thinly when faced with the demands of employing sufficient teachers, providing adequate resources and investing in physical infrastructure.

In common with many primary schools in rural Kenya, Mkamenyi Primary School is in a truly pathetic state, with overcrowded classrooms, filthy and unhygienic sanitation facilities, and a chronic lack of teachers, educational materials, furniture, food and water.

Children sit on pot-holed and crumbling classroom floors, those few lucky enough to be seated at one of the few useable desks squeezed alongside three or four other classmates.

The solitary water tank has long-ago stopped being capable of harvesting and storing rainwater, leaving the school without any on-site source of clean water for drinking, cooking and cleaning. Toilets, too few in number for the high pupil roll, are so rancid that children prefer to urinate and defecate in the open bush instead.

In the face of these overwhelming challenges, and without sufficient government support to invest in the necessary redevelopment, the school is simply unable to provide an education worth having to the 500+ children that it serves.

About our plans

Of all the schools we have worked with, Mkamenyi is arguably the one in most desperate need of our expertise and support, so it is perhaps fitting that we should begin our second decade as a charity with what will be our most ambitious project to date, and one which will set new standards.

A piecemeal, long-term redevelopment is not the solution for Mkamenyi; something much more radical and immediate is required. With that in mind, we have put together exciting plans for a two-year, £250,000 project to comprehensively rebuild, remodel and expand the school.

In addition to essential core facilities including sufficiently furnished classrooms, a staffroom and offices, and safe toilets, the new school will also incorporate:

- a multi-purpose hall and kitchen to facilitate the introduction of a whole-school feeding programme and remove hunger as a barrier to learning;
- establishment of a dedicated resource room to include a library and, ultimately, computer equipment;
- a rainwater harvesting system capable of storing at least 100,000 litres of water (about 200 litres per pupil) to provide the school with a reliable, year-round supply of clean water;
- a playground for the pre-school pupils as well as landscaped garden areas and an assembly ground to create a beautiful as well as functional school.





Our track-record and background

With over 10 years' experience working in this field we have earned a reputation as one of the leading school-development charities in the region. Our most recent partner school, Ngambenyi Primary, has been declared a 'model' school by the local county government following our two-year, £110,000 redevelopment and it is widely regarded as one of most child-friendly and well-equipped schools in the county, eclipsed perhaps only by those that have been constructed by the Chinese!

We currently support seven partner schools in the isolated Kasigau region of south-east Kenya and in addition to improving the fabric of these schools, we also provide an on-going, long-term programme of support which includes the provision of a daily lunch to all 2,500 pupils, funding for much-needed additional teachers (currently 17 in total) and the ad-hoc supply of books and other educational resources and equipment.
